A shuffled lineup didn't keep the Grafton girls' swimming and diving team from cruising to a North Shore Conference road win last week.

Despite using swimmers in events they usually don't enter, the Black Hawks sailed past Nicolet,





"I tried to give the girls a chance to see what they could do in different events," Grafton coach John Douglass said.

The Hawks' success included 1-2 finishes in a pair of events.

"I believe those are the top two times in the state in that event this season," Douglass said.

Gabby Kraus won the diving with 201.25 points, and Paige Schommer was second with 192.7. Both scores were personal bests for six-dive competitions.

Grafton's other swimming wins included Senczyszyn in the 100 breaststroke (1:04.06), Emma O'Brien in the 200 individual medley (2:20.86), Natalie Keshemberg in the 50 freestyle (25.26), Stephanie Haebig in the 100 backstroke (1:02.81) and Autumn Haebig in the 500 freestyle (5:05.98).
